



An Act Relative to Language Access and Inclusion

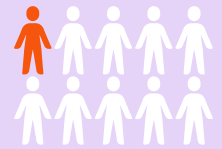

People depend on state agencies to address needs and challenges – from applying for unemployment assistance, to keeping food on the table and staving off an eviction, to navigating the complexities of the child welfare system. But language access failures at critical agencies deny non-English speaking families access to government services and information that protect and empower state residents.

Language barriers affect hundreds of thousands of state residents. Massachusetts must dismantle longstanding barriers to equal access and ensure state agencies meet the language needs of all residents.



Nearly **1 in 10** MA residents is considered limited English proficient.

The Language Access and Inclusion Act would:

Ensure Effective Communication For All Communities

Require all public-facing agencies, and outside service providers they use, to offer interpretation services and translate vital documents, including websites and online applications, for limited English proficient speakers.

Standardize and Enforce Robust Language Access Plans

Provide minimum standards for these plans and require regular data collection so that state agencies know the linguistic needs of the populations they serve.

Ensure Adequate Staffing to Meet Language Access Needs

Require agencies to employ statewide and regional language access coordinators to develop, implement, and train staff on agency language access plans and protocols.

Engage Communities to Assist Agencies with Compliance

Create an advisory board with representatives from limited English speaking communities, the deaf or hard-of-hearing community, and community groups/legal service providers to help agencies implement the law.

Create Mechanisms for Phased-In Implementation

Initially apply to 12 essential public-facing state agencies [1] that provide services such as healthcare, housing, education, and childcare, before expanding to include other executive offices.
